
### **BREAKTHROUGH CELEBRATES 30 YEARS IN 2025!**





# A CONVERSATION WITH BREAKTHROUGH'S FOUNDING AND CURRENT EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS, JULIE FRIEDBERG (GFS '89) AND MICHELLE PALMER

### Under Breakthrough's Spell

Breakthrough's goal is to infuse a true love of learning and passion for education that will ripple through its students' communities and impact their futures decisively. A testament to that ripple effect is the launch of the program 30 years ago.

"I had such an incredible experience – an absolutely transformative experience – working with the program during college that I thought: Why isn't this in Germantown?," said Julie Friedberg, who spearheaded the opening of the Philadelphia site in 1995.

Julie had worked at three different Breakthrough programs (then called Summerbridge) around the country, even though education was not part of her career plan at the time; she was studying History, with a minor in Music.

An alumna of Germantown Friends School, she was intimately familiar with the school's values and community dynamics in the area. "I thought Breakthrough would be great for Germantown and for the school, a win-win situation," she said.

She reached out to Dick Wade, who was then stepping into his role as GFS' Head of School, with a proposal to bring the program to Philadelphia. Wade convened a committee of volunteers to assess the project's viability, and Julie was tapped to head Breakthrough of Greater Philadelphia after graduating from college.

Now she needed to get the word out to the community at large and public schools to recruit students – it was time to build a shared vision.

"I had no idea if there would be interest, or how students would respond," she said. "But they were incredibly excited about it, and that was thrilling."


Working out of a desk with no computer, Julie was surprised when three students from Clarence E. Pickett Middle School, now a Mastery Charter school, walked onto the GFS campus to deliver their applications for the summer program.

"These kids had never been on campus before, but they wanted to come in and hand deliver [their applications]," she said. "I was really moved by that...and that was the beginning." That first class welcomed 24 sixth-grade students.

Julie leaned on her experiences of Breakthrough in Manchester, NH, Providence, RI, and New Orleans, LA, to design the program that would be taught in Philadelphia. Besides drawing from elements in those chapters' curricula, she added some of Germantown's own flavor to the program.

"Service learning was a big driver for me, and that was new to most programs back then," Julie said. "We had something called Build Up Germantown, in which the kids were basically in interdisciplinary projects...the academics were infused with or driven by community projects."
















Teaching and learning, learning and teaching — education is a two-way street and a lifelong process. The high school and college students above know this well — they're student instructors at Summerbridge Germantown, the summer enrichment program at Germantown Friends School which gives 6th and 7th grade students from Northwest public schools a leg up in their pursuit of academic excellence. The instructors, who hall from schools all over the United States, are learning as well — what it's like to interact with other races, what it's like to give back to the community.


### The Magic of Breakthrough

Some of the main priorities for Breakthrough of Greater Philadelphia in the mid-1990s remain top of mind for current Executive Director Michelle Palmer.

"Educating the community and fundraising are among my top priorities for Breakthrough; we are really trying to take it to the next level," said Michelle. "We've had significant gains in the past few years, but I want us to get to a place where we could have an endowment, and one day maybe even provide scholarships."

Much of the momentum to gather the support and funding to open the Philadelphia chapter stemmed from the program's compelling vision and mission. But what Julie couldn't quite appreciate then was that the so-called "magic of Breakthrough" was already at work before any kid walked into a classroom that summer.

"It's the belief in the power of young people," she said. "I was young, the staff was young, we were all young, and that's the special sauce of this program."



Indeed, the dual-mission of providing free academic enrichment for traditionally underserved youth and handson teaching experiences for college students creates an alchemy that is very unique in learning environments.

As Michelle put it: "The magic of Breakthrough is when middle schoolers come together with college students. Their eyes open up in a different way. They are eager to learn, and it gives

them a new experience. They're impressed that their teachers are young, energized, and for a lot of them, they have teachers who look like them as well."

This near-peer learning experience breeds a joy of learning. Building cohesion through rituals, songs, special handshakes and "spirit checks," program participants forge deep connections while being offered consistent support to grow academically and socially.

"It is really fun for them, and that is so much a part of Breakthrough – we're not just your average academic enrichment program, we are much more than that," said Michelle.

#### The Next 30 Years

Since its 1995 launch, Breakthrough has grown despite a few bumps on the road. This year, the program will enroll approximately 200 middle schoolers, 50 high schoolers, and 40 college students hopeful for a career as educators.

All that growth serves as inspiration and affirmation for Breakthrough to continue evolving to accommodate the needs of Scholars and Teaching Fellows, and adapting to trends in education broadly.

"We started our College Bound program back up this year to make sure that our students are prepared for testing and supported as far as resume building and getting ready for college overall...including understanding finances," said Michelle.

"We will continue to bring in professional development for Teaching Fellows and aim to give them a competitive stipend so they can enjoy the experience, learn about all aspects of teaching, and...get the full grasp of what it's going to take for them to be in the classroom," she said.

For Julie, who is now an executive and leadership coach focusing on education, Breakthrough is ripe for positively influencing the education ecosystem.

"[Breakthrough] has the potential to scale and absolutely be infused into how we do school," said Julie. This is especially true as more people consider alternative ways for career advancement in light of the high cost of college education.

"There is a whole set of teacher apprenticeships around the country and it would be amazing to have [Breakthrough] funnel into the

apprenticeship model, so that this could be a pathway for the Teaching Fellows and the Scholars as well," she said.

Looking into a crystal ball - or drawing up a strategy plan - Michelle paints the picture for Breakthrough for the next 30 years.

"One day we hope that Breakthrough will not need to be in existence, because we hope to live in a place where educational equity is a reality, education is prioritized for all students, and all students have equal opportunities," said Michelle. "That may not be the case...so we will continue to flourish and grow, we will stay the course and make sure that we are leveling the playing field for our students."

## A PATH IN EDUCATION TRACED WITH CURIOSITY, SERVICE AND A NOTECARD

As a Teaching Fellow at Breakthrough of Greater Philadelphia, Rex Yin carried a small card in his folder with a personal reminder: Be the best teacher you can be.

"That was like my daily mantra...and part of that was being authentic to myself," he said. Whether rejoicing in the best classroom moments or wrestling with the difficult ones, the most important thing is "recognizing that those are the ways that we can grow as educators."

He was a Teaching Fellow in the summers of 2013 and 2014, and returned to Breakthrough in 2019 as an Instructional Coach for Middle School Science, guiding aspiring educators on their professional paths.

Now an education researcher and practitioner, Rex's own journey reflects a resiliency and curiosity ignited by growing up in an immigrant community, and a steadfast commitment to engendering the best possible educational outcomes for underserved children.

Born in Thailand to Cambodian war refugee parents, the family moved to the U.S. when Rex was two years old. They moved again when he was 4, this time to Philadelphia, where he attended public schools and immersed himself in the Cambodian community through faith-based voluntary work and activities.

His parents gave him "free rein" to explore his interests, he said, and he studied culinary arts at vocational high school Jules E. Mastbaum. An English teacher recognized his academic potential and guided him to work with an educational non-profit organization to apply to college.

He enrolled at Gettysburg College in 2010. During his sophomore year, he took a course on immigration, culture and education that led to a decisive turn in his path. Rex had to research the education experiences of an ethnic community in the U.S. – he worked on a project on Cambodian Americans in Philadelphia.

"It unraveled so much that I wasn't aware of," said Rex. "It even explained my own journey in education...that it wasn't normal to have outdated textbooks, it wasn't normal to walk through metal detectors day after day, it wasn't normal to hear teachers talk about that we just don't have enough, and we're going to do what we can with what we have."

Seeing more clearly the inequities of the education system in minority communities, Rex designed a major in educational research with a focus on education diversity and culture. Next step was to get some "meaningful" hands-on experience, so he became a Teaching Fellow at Breakthrough.

"At Breakthrough is where it really felt personal," he said. "That first summer revealed so much about the field of education, the professional development opportunities and connecting with current educators, people from other education-focused organizations and the work they are doing." He returned the following year to deepen the learning of teaching skills and the connections with budding and established educators.

His experience with Breakthrough instilled in him the certainty that middle school years are crucial for children's futures, and after college,

he earned his Master of Education at Eastern University, and worked as a Middle School Science teacher in Philadelphia for seven years, from 2016 to 2022.

Rex remained involved in the Cambodian community, writing grants for educational programs as a volunteer at the Cambodian Association of Greater Philadelphia, and eventually joined the organization full-time to establish children and youth educational support programs and partnerships, all the while continuing to advocate for equity in education.

Rex's advocacy work paved the way to the next phase in his career, when he joined Acelero Learning, a provider of equity-centered kindergarten education programs. He worked with the Mayor's Office for Children and Families on a Pre-K initiative, developing and facilitating training on diversity, equity, inclusion and belonging (DEIB) to more than 200 early education providers in Philadelphia. He is currently the DEIB Manager for Acelero.

From his experience at Breakthrough, Rex still holds some valuable insights.

"I really appreciate the empowered learning culture of Breakthrough, which means that there is autonomy and opportunity," he said. Although the Fellows have specific roles during the summer program, there is room for creativity and agency in the student-centered teaching experience, said Rex.

For future Teaching Fellows, he hopes they take time to rest, restore and be genuine.

"Many successful educators have always seen rest as an act of recovery but also of active resistance... so for the Teaching Fellows committed to really not just teaching but also fighting for education and justice, prioritizing well-being is a way for us to continue that fight day after day."

Standing in front of a classroom of young students can be like staring into a mirror, so the way to succeed is to be "your authentic self," said Rex. "The children you teach have a way in which they can bring the best out of you, and they can also bring the worst out of you...and in those moments is when we can actually think about how we are being the best that we can be."

Carrying a little note card as a reminder to be the best is always an option.

We are proud of the progress our Scholars and Teaching Fellows are making and look forward to an exciting summer season ahead!



This year marks the official launch of Breakthrough's year-round College Bound program. Our high school students have been especially busy this Fall/Winter with activities both on and off campus.

We began this programming year with team building in the trees at TreeTop Quest Philadelphia, where students learned how to trust their instincts and each other to navigate some tricky ropes courses.

We also visited the Share Food Program to spend our morning packing food boxes for senior citizens living at or below the poverty line.

Despite it being an early morning, Scholars enjoyed their time and even asked for opportunities to go back!

We also had a day full of career conversations where we learned about careers in the arts, data analytics, packaging engineering, and commercial real estate development. We followed that up with our annual resume writing workshop, and this year, Scholars also worked on elevator pitches with our partners at BCG.

11th grade Scholars have commenced their 12-week SAT prep course. Over the next 12 weeks, they will learn test taking strategies from our test prep instructor at MJ Test Prep. This grueling course will maximize their opportunities during the college application process. We are so excited to see how our students grow along this journey!



The Pennsylvania Educational Improvement
Tax Credit (EITC) program allows individual
taxpayers, businesses, or corporations to
redirect their state tax liability and support an
Educational Improvement Organization (EIO),
such as Breakthrough of Greater Philadelphia.

Participants in the EITC program make a minimum contribution of \$7,500 per year for two consecutive years, which supports innovative academic programs and operational costs at Breakthrough. In turn, participants receive a PA state tax credit for up to 90% of their contribution amount. For example, a contribution of \$10,000 has a net cost of \$1,000 for the donor; you may even be able to claim a federal charitable deduction on your out-of-pocket cost.
